LETTER CARRIERS TO PERFORM DOUBLE DUTY ON SATURDAY DURING “STAMP OUT HUNGER FOOD DRIVE”

GREENVILLE - On Saturday May 12, Letter Carriers in Greenville, and across the country, will perform double duty on their routes – deliver the mail and collect food items during the **20th Annual STAMP OUT HUNGER FOOD DRIVE**. Food donations in Greenville will benefit the Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina at Greenville, located at 497 West Ninth Street.

On Stamp Out Hunger Day, the public is asked to simply place bags filled with nonperishable food items next to their mailbox. A Letter Carrier will collect the donation and take it back to their postal branch where Food Bank volunteers will be on site throughout the day to unload the postal trucks.

The Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina has more than 545,000 individuals in their 34-county service area who struggle to put and keep meals on the table. In the ten counties served by the Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina at Greenville, 120,480 individuals are at risk of hunger. More than 50 percent are children and seniors.

The Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive comes at a critical time when holiday food drive donations are long gone.

The Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina is a nonprofit organization that has provided food for people at risk of hunger in 34 counties in central and eastern North Carolina for 30 years. The Food Bank serves a network of more than 800 partner agencies such as soup kitchens, food pantries, shelters, and programs for children and adults through warehouses in Durham, Greenville, New Bern, Raleigh, the Sandhills (Southern Pines) and Wilmington. In fiscal year 2010-2011, the Food Bank distributed more than 42 million pounds of food and non-food essentials through these agencies.
