LETTER CARRIERS PERFORMED DOUBLE DUTY DURING STAMP OUT HUNGER

WILMINGTON - On Saturday May 14, Letter Carriers in Wilmington, and across the country, performed double duty on their routes – delivered the mail and collected food items during the **19th Annual STAMP OUT HUNGER FOOD DRIVE**. In the Food Bank's 34-county service area, more than 277,648 pounds (233,809 meals) were collected. Wilmington Letter Carriers collected 38,648 of the 277,648 pounds. Food donations will benefit the Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina at Wilmington located at 1314 Marstellar Street in Wilmington.

The Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina has more than 545,000 individuals in their 34-county service area who struggle to put and keep meals on the table. In the four counties served by the Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina at Wilmington, more than 61,000 individuals are at risk of hunger with more than 40% being children and seniors.

The Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive comes at a critical time when holiday donations are long gone. The Food Bank is preparing for the increase partners, such as food pantries, see when thousands of children who are on the free and reduced-cost meal program will no longer have access to the school cafeteria during summer break. The Food Bank is also currently providing relief to areas affected by the April tornadoes.

In 2010, more than 300,000 pounds of non-perishable food items were collected along postal routes in the Food Bank's 34 counties. Letter Carriers in Wilmington collected more than 38,000 pounds of the 300,000.
